
Contact Sheet

They can still be entered in the show as in the past, but will not be in their own niche. We will add a paid third and fourth place with Honorable Mentions getting the various prizes that we are able to collect.

We need people to help get the show prizes, help with the open house and the Art Walk sponsored by the Art Council. Please help with these efforts since you benefit from these club efforts!
