

We are going to change out the photographs that we have in the corridor at the Eastern Idaho Regional Medical Center in the very near future. This has been a very good exposure for our club and we have had a couple dozen of the images sold to the people who have to go the hallway to get to work, to the Emergency Room, or to the lab and Xray. The frames and matting have been provided by the hospital; and this time around, they are even covering the printing of the images. But they need our new images to fit the current framing and format - - seventeen as landscape and eight as portrait in their orientation. Therefore, the December meeting was a presentation by various club members of what they would like to hang.

And this was the essence of our club's purpose and existence - - sharing images and discussing the various photos to decide which would best represent this region to the people who traverse the hallways of the hospital. What an incredible set of images we saw that night! We have always stressed that this is a learning environment; and that the more images we present, the more

that we **all** learn. Sometimes, we forget what incredibly beautiful area of the world we get to call our home and this came to the fore by the photographs that our members have captured. Exotic locations have our focus since the local areas are "routine" in our mindset, but these images show that our eyes have been open when we have our cameras in our hands. It truly is going to be very difficult to pare the images we saw down to just twenty-five prints. Probably, we will present the hospital with about 40-50 images and let them whittle the numbers down. But one criterion they need to follow remains that each club member will have an image at the end of the selection period.

These images will be taken to 16 x 20 sizes and be viewed by people that are only a couple feet away. Therefore, the image has to be tack sharp, and if done digitally, there must be no jags from pixilation. Amazingly, the images shown at the meeting all met these severe clarity expectations. Since I am one of the members who still shoots most of their images in the silver-based format, this clarity convinced me that I need to get more involved in digital photography. Maybe I will be converted to the digital world.

The energy and excitement in the room all night long with the spirited discussion reminded us all why we have

enjoyed the camaraderie of the camera club for all of these years. This is the essence of EIPS and the reason for our continuance.

The Advancement Program has always been a work in progress and we have modified it several times over the years to make it better for the people who want to participate. In fact, we even gave extra points for being a judge when no one would volunteer for that task in the early years of the club. This year we went to all members being the judge for each image and an average for image being presented as the total. When I total the prints for the year, I will try to take the partial amounts into account.

In the past we have given extra points to those who have done extra work on their images in the darkroom since it would take from 30 to 60 minutes to get a good image - - and this was a good learning tool for the photographer. A really good negative made a good print very quickly, but a difficult negative was a bear to achieve any image at all. But now, the darkroom is virtually dead with papers and chemicals disappearing from the marketplace. With the shift toward digital images and the use of PhotoShop, we need to find a way to award those who are doing extensive work on the images.

And yet there are problems with this approach. If you have a really good image on your shot and you just have to press the print button on your computer, should this person be awarded extra effort over the person who had to correct many areas of an image in PhotoShop? How can you tell? The end point may be the same. Since we now use a projector for the digital files, maybe there should be extra points for the ones that are printed because of the extra **cost** of printing an image. The print should show better resolution than is available in the projected image. Also, it can be hard to evaluate the projected image since it many times is so different from the one you see on the computer screen! Please give me some input about extra points for PhotoShop work on digital images.

Field Trip

We did Christmas lights around Idaho Falls as our field trip this month. With the snow on the ground, this was much more effective than when we tried to do this a few years ago. Somehow, green grass (really dark at night) did not fit our preconceptions of a snowy effect in our pictures. Also, the previous Christmas lights field trip was done in the pre-digital era of photography, and we did not get as high of percentage of good images as on this trip.

Please help our field trip coordinator with suggestions since each of us have our favorite areas to go for images in this areas. With gas prices finally coming back down again, we hope to schedule some of our trips further away from Idaho Falls. In that same fashion, please help the program chairman with finding and/or presenting lectures in your photographic expertise area. Each person in the club has knowledge that can help other members and we need to continue to share that information.


