

More History of Photography

(Where we left off in the July newsletter)

1826 - Joseph Nicephore Niepce - Heliography – first image created by the process itself.

1835 - Fox Talbot - Worked with silver salts soaked on paper.

1839 - Louis Jacque Daguerre - Daguerreotype – used silver coated copper plates and iodine to capture the image.

Next step was also in 1839 by Fox Talbot and John Herschel. Herschel found in 1819 that Sodium Hyposulphate would stop the action of the light on the residual silver on the paper. This made the image stable and permanent. He mentioned this to Fox Talbot in 1839 who then incorporated it in his process with paper soaked in silver salts. ("Hypo" is still in use today in B&W processing!) Now a photographer could make multiple images of same image. It also was paper based. Its disadvantages were that the quality of image not as sharp as daguerreotype and it still took several minutes of exposure.
